# Richmond principal retires after 40 years

After spending forty years in education, Richmond principal Eugene Jakubiak has decided to retire from public education and spend time with his family. Jakubiak's most recent position in the Richmond Community Schools was as principal of the Will L. Lee elementary school.

"Every job I have had in Richmond has been great," Jakubiak says. "I have received more satisfaction in these last three years than any other job, because I can see the eagerness of kids wanting to learn."

Jakubiak started his career in Richmond with eight years of teaching English and speech in the high school. He also was in charge of the drama club. While teaching at the high school, Jakubiak took part in the move to the newly built high school over the Christmas break in 1961. He still remembers students and teachers moving everything from the old building to the new school.

After his eight years at the high school, Jakubiak left for a year for the First Community Education Program, a fellowship program that sent him to the Flint schools for the 1965-66 school year.

Jakubiak returned to Richmond and his career turned towards administrative duties when he became the acting principal of the high school. He held that position for 20 years.

During his tenure at the high school, Jakubiak experienced one of his highlights of his career. The school was awarded the North Central Association of Schools accreditation, the first time in the school's history. The school maintained the honor for three years until the school became financially strapped and was forced to cut back on programs, losing the accreditation.

"I hope that sometime in the future we could strive to become accredited again," wishes Jakubiak.

The Richmond administrator also experienced some low points of his career at the high school. "Many millages failed to pass", explains Jakubiak.

In the fall of 1986, Jakubiak decided a change was necessary and worked in public relations for the district, but he could not stay away from the children for long. Jakubiak returned to the school buildings in 1990 as the assistant principal for the middle school. He remained there for another four years before moving to the primary school as principal where he has spent the past three years and where students prefer to call him "Mr. J."

"Some of the students have trouble pronouncing my last name, so this is much easier," explains Jakubiak.

Another high point in his long career has just recently occurred.

"We just passed this tremendous bond issue and the future of Richmond schools is set with new facilities and technologies," notes Jakubiak.

Jakubiak has planned on retiring for a number of years.

"I believe forty years is a significant amount of time," Jakubiak said. "It is time to pass the baton to someone younger."

Jakubiak plans on keeping

busy in his retirement. He and his wife, Sue, recently purchased a home just north of Memphis. Jakubiak also plans staying close to teaching, but now he will stick to hunter education, something he has done for 20 years.

"There are also a number of lakes I haven't fished yet," Jakubiak commented.

Jakubiak has had a number of surprises this year since announcing his retirement. The school board presented the principal with a rocking chair with the Richmond seal etched onto it, something Jakubiak plans to get a lot of use out of in the future. The Parent Teacher Association held a surprise reception for him as well. Former students and colleagues related past experiences and memories for the benefit for Jakubiak, his family, and friends.

Last week while Jakubiak was in an administrative meeting at the central office, he received a call urging him to return to the school immediately. Upon his return, Jakubiak feared the worst as he saw the entire school waiting for his arrival outside the building.

"I thought there was some sort of evacuation emergency," admitted Jakubiak.

The principal soon realized the students were waiting to honor him with yet another surprise. Students gave the principal cards and hand-made paper ties, then proceeded to sing a song in honor of him. In addition, a tree was planted near the building in honor of his dedication and service.

For Jakubiak, working with the kids has been deeply rewarding.

"Seeing the light of understanding when a kid grasps a concept or idea. The knowledge that you do have some influence on helping our young people become successful. It's a number of intangible things that leads to a deep satisfaction," reflects the elementary principal.

Jakubiak will miss working in the Richmond schools and the Richmond

schools will miss him. He leaves with one bit of advice for his predecessor.
