





On June 10, 1889, a special meeting took place and the decision was made to build a Hall in 1890. The location was decided on a year later at the Annual meeting, 329 votes were cast-191 for a Wales Center site and 138 for a Lambs site. Of course, women were not allowed to vote as yet. Also, allocated was \$500 in 1889 and \$500 levied in 1890 to fund the building. The property was once owned by William Bowen.

Based on information collected, the first meeting that was held in the "Town Hall was on November 8, 1890 and a Mr. Lashbrook was hired as a Janitor. His salary was \$12.00 a year.






We would not have a 125 year old Hall today, if it had not been for the quick actions of some great public servants at the time of the arson fire. The St. Clair County Deputy Sheriff who spotted the fire, reported it, and attacked it with his vehicle fire extinguisher; and the quick response of the Memphis Fire Department, who not only put out the fire, but protected many of the valuable files inside; saved our dear old hall.


While the building was being repaired and restored, the Board of Trustees needed a place to hold their meetings. The City of Memphis was gracious enough to allow the use of their City Hall meeting room during that time.

When our Hall was once again ready for business, an open House was held on April 5, 2007, for the public to view the repairs and improvements.


Wales Township Park


The Maccabee Hall

The Maccabee Hall was built around 1900
The Hall served as a meeting place for the people of Goodells.
Many plays and dances were held there.
In 1912 the old "infirmary" of County Park Drive burned and the "inmates" were housed at the Hall while the "infirmary" was being rebuilt.

National Order of Patrons and Husbandry ...or known as National GRANGE



Founded after the Civil War on December 4th 1867, in Washington D.C. by seven men, later a women was named hohoray member.

Started out as a secret order, based on some of the rituals and symbols of the Freemasonry. The Grange is not longer a secret. Oaths and passwords the Bible and small farm tools often displayed at meetings.

Motto: In essentials, unity, in non-essentials liberty, in all things, charity.

Family and community roots agriculture, a healthy environment for small and large farms. farmers working together for keeping prices for grain and wages compatible. Regulating prices of rail frieght rates and mortgage rates at a reasonable rate. Free mail delivery was started in 1867 with efforts form the Grange. Help establish the Farm Credit system.

Many women attended the meetings, and held offices in early years, because men were working in the fields and taking care of the animals.

Grange: Latin for Grain Husbandry: Breeding and health of the animals







After ninety-nine years of sitting by the edge of Wales Center Road, the old Wales Township Hall was being lifted from it's failing stone foundation, to be placed on a new cement block basement, further away from traffic. The move was completed in 1989, complete with indoor plumbing and central heat, at a cost of \$40,000, much less than the cost of a new building.


Wales Township Hall Historical Dedication 1890-2000

The Wales Townshp Hall became a State recognized Local Historical Site in September of 2000.


On September 17, 2000, the township Board of Trustees hosted an open house in honor of the recognition and installation of the marker.

Darwin Drake Barn

Barn belonging to Darwin Drake on Wales Center Rd. The original barn had the hip roof taken off in tornado and they did not replace the hip roof on the barn.

In recent years the barn has been in the process of being torn down, ...slowly. Now all that is there are the huge beams.

Darwin Drake born in town of Gouverneur, St. Lawrence Co., New York.

Mr. Drake was a school teacher in New York and Iowa before coming to Michigan in 1870 and buying forty acres of partly improved land in Goodells on Wales Center Rd. He improved the balance of his farm while teaching.


Mr. Drake was Postmaster of Goodells for ten years, and Superintendent of schools for eight years, he also served as Justice of the Peace.

Mr. Drake married Lodema Burch of Gouverneur, NY in 1858. Held the office of Deacon in the Baptist Church and had two sons, Harvey E. and Charles B.

Mr. Drake died in 1905, and is buried in Yale.

In 1988, the Wales Township Boards made the decision to have a basement dug and to move the Hall onto it. The old foundation was crumbling from old age. The Hall now sits 120 feet East of the original site, where it was moved in February, 1988.

On November 10, 1992, at 7:30 in the evening, there was a dedication to the Hall and also a celebration for Mr. Joe Wright, outgoing Trustee who has given a lot to the Township. Joe took office as Trustee in November 1980 and now after 12 years is retiring.
